Gospel Reflection

The Lectionary of this Easter season draws out some of the 'classic' gospel passages, particularly some of the discourses from the Gospel of John. Like many 'famous' or familiar passages, it can be true that familiarity breeds contempt – we think we are so familiar with the passage that we don't need to pay it much attention.

At first glance, it appears that there is a certain ruthlessness about the image of the vinedresser pruning the vine: perform or perish! However, the process of cutting away and pruning branches is an incredibly nurturing action; it is removing the unproductive portions of the plant so that the vine has an even better opportunity to produce fruit in the next season. It an act of love; not an act of economic rationalism. Within our own lives we are called to make decisions about which of our thoughts and actions are life-giving (fruit-bearing) and which are unproductive; negative; crippling; life-diminishing. If we are able to 'prune' our life-diminishing thoughts and actions we allow ourselves the freedom and the ability to really flourish. Feelings of jealousy, greed, resentment, self-doubt and lack of confidence can limit our ability to be fully alive just as addictive and harmful behaviours can physically take away our ability to perform at our best.

I am reminded of the old Karate Kid movie when the boy, Daniel, is introduced to the art of bonsai. He is told to close his eyes, imagine the perfect tree and then start clipping and shaping the plant to make real the perfection that lies within it. It is only through a process of cutting away and pruning that we can nurture ourselves to realise the beauty of our potential.

HISTORICAL CONTEXT – The 'True' vine

The image of the vine has its origins in Psalm 80 where the nation of Israel is likened to a vine: 'You brought a vine out of Egypt; you drove out the nations and planted it. You cleared the ground for it; it took deep root and filled the land.' (Ps 80:8-9) However, the people of Israel have

forgotten who they are and who it was that planted them in their country – it is like the rootstock of a grafted plant has taken over and gone wild. Jesus' presence as the 'true vine' reminds them of what they are called to be.

Watch out for scam emails (phishing)

Scam emails or phishing (pronounced 'fishing') are emails that are often made to appear as if they were sent from individuals or organisations you think you know, or you think you should trust. They are designed to trick individuals out and of their information. money Phishing communications often mimic professional phrasing, branding and logos of authentic businesses in order to appear genuine. They are designed to defraud individuals and businesses by: requesting or pretending to confirm personal information, passphrases or credit card numbers; demand payment for a fake account; or by tricking them into clicking a harmful link or attachment. Attachments may contain malware, which is software designed to harm your computer or to gain access to your computer without your knowledge.

Phishing is not just limited to email. These scams are delivered via SMS, instant messaging and social media. Phishing is becoming increasingly difficult to identify, as cybercriminals adapt their methods and find new ways to steal money and data.

General rules to follow:

- Never believe emails that have different names within the email body, email address or the sent from fields.
- Do not open messages or their attachments, or click on links from unfamiliar individuals or organisations.
- Remember that reputable organisations including banks, government departments, online shopping and social media companies will not call or email to verify or update your personal information. This includes companies such as Amazon, PayPal, Google, Apple and Facebook.
- Do not provide personal information to unverified sources and never provide someone with remote access to your computer.
- Keeping your devices up to date with their software updates (computers, phone, Tablets etc..)
- Never share passphrases with others.
- Use strong unique passphrases for every account.

REFLECTION FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

A major theme of the Scripture readings is 'Jesus is our vine'.


In today's first reading, Saul (now Paul, after his conversion and baptism) tries to join the disciples of Jesus. Saul had previously made a habit of persecuting Christians, and the disciples are still afraid of him. However, Barnabas intercedes and says that Paul has seen and talked with the Lord and is now spreading the Gospel of Jesus. But speaking about Jesus is dangerous. There is an attempt on Paul's life. The disciples send him away for protection. The new church, despite its struggles, is growing and thriving.

Psalm 21 is a praise and promise psalm. The psalmist calls on families, nations and all the earth to praise God. This psalm also reads as a public commitment to fulfill a promise of service and to pass on the message of salvation to future generations.

The second reading says that it is not enough just to talk about Jesus, faith must be expressed through action. We hear again God's great

commandments – to have faith in Jesus and to love one another.

In the reading from John's Gospel, Jesus uses the image of the vine and branches to show how important it is to stay connected to him, to keep growing in faith. God is the vine grower. Jesus is the vine. We are the branches. The vine also represents the Christian community. The Christian community is fruitful if it proclaims and witnesses the Gospel to others. Those who hide their faith are like dead branches that need to be pruned.



Jesus says that we must be fruitful disciples.

LIVING THE GOSPEL

Bearing fruit

The vinedresser of this passage cuts away the dead branches and prunes back those that are not bearing fruit. In what way do we bear fruit? When we strive to reach our fullest potential in whatever we do, we bear fruit. When we act out of motivation for the other person rather than ourselves, we bear fruit. When we strive to bring about the reign of God in our small part of the world, we bear fruit. Sometimes we too need to have some of our thoughts and actions pruned so that we might better bear the fruit that we are truly capable of producing.
