REFLECTION By Greg Sunter

Fifty years ago the word 'stress' was only ever applied to materials like steel and the wings of planes. But since then, along with 'pressure', it has first crept into our language and more lately become an everyday term. Everyone experiences stress now. You can even hear Grade One students talk about the stress they're under at school! Perhaps it's the ever-growing pace of life or an innate competitiveness but pressure and stress have become part of daily life for most people in the so-called civilised world. Although he may never have used the words 'stress' or 'pressure', Jesus knew all about the demands of ministry with other people. When the disciples returned from their first efforts away from Jesus he knew that they needed some time out to debrief, to pray and to re-energise themselves. He ordered them all into a boat and they headed for a lonely place where they could be by themselves and rejuvenate. Jesus recognised the importance of taking time out. If you are engaged in a vocation or ministry that sees you meeting the needs of others, you need some time out to reflect on your experiences; time to hold those people up to God in prayer; time to make sense of your work and the interactions you've shared; time to simply recharge your batteries so that you can once again give fully of yourself.

Unfortunately, when Jesus arranged for himself and the disciples to have some time out, the crowd anticipated where they were going and actually beat them there! When the disciples arrived at their lonely spot, they were once again overwhelmed by the crowd. However, Jesus recognised the demands of the crowd as being more urgent than the demands of the disciples and himself. He took pity on them – he was moved by compassion – and responded to their need.

Historical Context Sheep and Shepherds

This gospel passage is one of many gospel references and even more Old Testament references to sheep and shepherds. It is an enduring image from the Bible. Much of it stems from the shepherd-become-King, David. When a monarchy developed in Israel it was clear that the role of king was like that of a shepherd, caring for his flock. Jesus applied the image to himself on several occasions, reinforcing an image of servant leadership. The language continues today, with bishops referred to as shepherds of their diocese and carrying a crosier that is reminiscent of a shepherd's crook.

God's Word

Unexpected Quiet

A major theme of the Scripture readings is 'Come rest awhile'.

Through Jeremiah, God warns the shepherds who divide and scatter the sheep. God will gather those sheep together who were not cared for before and find a good shepherd to look after them. This good shepherd is a 'shoot of David', which many biblical scholars see as an allusion to the coming of Jesus and the fulfillment of God's promise to David to continue his line of descendants.

The psalmist describes the Lord God as a good shepherd. He gives a job description for a good shepherd as one who provides green pastures and restful waters, who shows the path to walk and gives courage in the dark valley, who calls people to the table and invites them to live in the Lord's house. This psalm is a personal favourite of many people because it is a prayer for comfort and protection.

The passage from Ephesians says that Christ not only brings peace, but he is peace. Like a shepherd who draws his flock together, Jesus draws us together into one community so that we are not alone, but one with others. Where there is hostility, Jesus brings reconciliation and peace.

The Gospel reading shows us that even Jesus and the Apostles needed a break now and then. Yet people kept coming to them. But even when he was tired, Jesus, like a good shepherd, had compassion for those who were in need. He saw the people as sheep without a shepherd, as in the first reading.
