First Reading: Numbers 11:25-29

Are you jealous on my account? Who decrees that all people may prophesy?

Responsorial Psalm: *Ps* 18:8. 10. 12-14. *R. v.9* (*R.*) The precepts of the Lord give joy to the heart.

The law of the Lord is perfect,

it revives the soul.

The rule of the Lord is to be trusted, it gives wisdom to the simple. (R.)

The fear of the Lord is holy, abiding for ever.
The decrees of the Lord are truth and all of them just. (R.)

REFLECTION by Greg Sunter

The first part of today's gospel deals with the disciples' jealousy at someone else 'cashing in' on Jesus' name and authority. It is a continuation of their limited understanding about the message and ministry of Jesus. They still cling to an idea that Jesus is going to rise up in power against the forces of Rome and, in the aftermath, they are going to be sitting pretty as associates of this powerful figure. The disciples have been blinded by their dreams of glory and forgotten that the real story is that people are being cured and having demons cast out. Rather than celebrating the healing that is occurring in Jesus' name, the disciples are jealous that it's someone else who is getting the credit. Jesus assures them, and us, that any good work being undertaken genuinely in his name is to be welcomed. It is a reminder to us that sometimes we look down on the work of others because 'they're not one of us', or 'they're not doing it our way'.

The second portion of the gospel is one of the really challenging teachings of Jesus. Drawing on the image of the community as being a whole body, the teaching suggests that it is better to remove the part of the body/community that is causing sinfulness than have the whole body/community perish. It is a concept we are familiar with in modern medicine: sometimes it is necessary to

remove diseased tissue to prevent the spread of disease. We are reminded that if we surround ourselves with negative people and negative influences, we too will become negative. If we separate ourselves from negative influences and surround ourselves with positive ones then the positive aspects of our lives will flourish.

The Fork in the Road

A major theme of the Scripture readings is 'God's way versus our way'.

In the reading from Numbers, the spirit bestowed on Moses is shared with the elders so that Moses is no longer the only one who can prophesy. Two of the elders who are not present when the spirit is shared, nevertheless began to prophesy. A young man expects Moses to respond with jealousy when this takes place. Instead Moses welcomes the sharing of the gift and explains that he wishes all people could be prophets and experience the Lord's Spirit. The psalm joyfully praises God as the Just Judge, who wisely sets laws for the people to follow. The psalmist seeks to serve the Lord by following God's rules. This response may seem odd because precepts and law are not something we connect with joy. Sometimes following the rules seems like nothing more than a burden. Could it be that our notion and purpose of law is quite different from that of God's?

The reading from the Letter of James is aimed at those whose main goal in life is getting rich. Many people get rich from exploiting others. We see it in our own country and around the world. If we are busy collecting and possessing wealth, we don't have much room for people in our life.

In the Gospel reading, the disciples, like some of the people in the first reading, are jealous of the gifts of others. They complain about someone else healing in God's name. Like Moses, Jesus welcomes the good being done by those outside their group and sees it as being

joined with the good done by the community of disciples. On the other hand, evildoers should not be tolerated, and if they are members of the community, they should be cut off much like a body part whose disease threatens the health of the whole body.

SEASON OF CREATION REFLECTION by Nick Brodie

Twice in today's Gospel Jesus refers to the everlasting fire of hell. Better to lose a hand or an eye than endure that, he says, making some dramatic points about sin and sacrifice.

At this moment in human history Jesus' choice of imagery and his message about dramatic action are especially pertinent. As Pope Francis declares in his encyclical Laudato Si', climate change is an imminent threat to our world. For Christians, this raises two issues directly relevant to this passage from Mark.

On the one hand, we have a duty to protect ourselves and each other from catastrophe by checking our own sinful behaviours and habits. We should seriously consider what we can do to reduce our reliance on fossil fuels through personal usage, investment options, and political choices. We cannot dodge responsibility on this issue. Our faith demands action.

On the other hand, we also have a duty to find common cause with everyone else who shares this concern. Pope Francis encourages us to work with people of other religions 'for the sake of protecting nature, defending the poor, and building networks of respect and fraternity.' When it comes to protecting our common home, 'Anyone who is not against us is for us.'

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Dear Bishop McKenna, the Priests and Parishioners of the Bathurst Diocese.

Many of you will be aware of the changing reality that the Sisters of St Joseph face in these times. Here in Australia this has meant that we have had to close precious ministries and facilities that have served our mission over many years.

The Congregational Leadership Team of the Sisters of Saint Joseph wish to announce the closure of our ministry at St Joseph's Convent Heritage and Conference Centre Perthville. It is with deep sadness that we are no longer able to continue the ministry, at St Joseph's Perthville which has been a significant part of the Josephite story in the Bathurst diocese and beyond. At and from this special place the Sisters have served you their people in many diverse ways.

We express our gratitude to the many Sisters who have lived and cared for this sacred site and the mission and ministry to which they have given life. For the Perthville Sisters it has been the place where they began their life as a Josephite and the place where the life and death of the Sisters has been celebrated.

The Sisters are mindful of the importance of this site as the founding Josephite community in NSW and the place from which the Diocesan Josephites of Whanganui, Goulburn, Lochinvar and Tasmania were founded and that Fr Julian Woods and St Mary MacKillop both stayed here on different occasions in its early history. We recognise its significance not only for the Sisters but also to the many women who were boarders here, those whose parishes were served over many years by Sisters from here and those who have enjoyed retreat and conference experiences, the parishioners, staff, Associates, volunteers and friends of the Sisters who have been part of the story over many years.

The Congregational Leadership Team has spent time researching possible options for the use of the property and have now decided to place the property on the market with the hope that it will continue to benefit the wider community in some way.

The sale process will continue to address heritage, historical and subdivision issues as far as possible and practical. The Sisters will retain ownership of the land on which the Sisters' cemetery is situated and access to it. Over 240 Sisters are buried here. A memorial to recognise the presence of the Sisters and their ministry on this sacred site and across the diocese for 152 years will be developed.

There will be a formal ritual of closure at an appropriate date still to be determined.

Please continue to hold the Sisters in your prayers as this significant time of transition.
